## From your Pastor and Teacher, Sharon~

*Our sufficiency is from God, who has qualified us to be ministers of a new covenant,  
a covenant in the Spirit that gives life.  
Adapted from 2 Corinthians 3:5-6*

In the past several years, April Fools' Day has taken on a very special meaning for me, as it was the day in 2002 when we began our ministry together. Each year, as April 1 approaches, I delightfully ponder the light-hearted nature of the day, and am filled with gratitude that such joy continues to define our shared work here at Redlands UCC.

To be sure, there are folks who are not always pleased with decisions made (including me, at times!). There are others whose paths take them away from RUCC, bringing sadness in the wake of their leaving. Still others return after an absence, and there are smiles and hugs all around. We are, after all, a human body with human emotions, reactions, and responses. More than that we are a body that, from its courageous beginnings, has been a sanctuary and a training ground for loving people, a community that is founded and grounded in the loving and compassionate ministry of the Christ.

We are not perfect in our work. Nor are we complete in and of ourselves. As the apostle Paul wrote to those feisty Corinthians in the first century, our sufficiency is from God, not us. I have come to believe, as I both participate in and prayerfully observe what we do around here, that any "success" we've achieved together has been because we know so-called "success" does not originate with us. Its origins are in the Spirit, who leads us, gently guides us, sometimes nudges us firmly from behind, and who always is present. As the apostle reminds us, Spirit's work is to "give life"—and that it does!

This month we continue what Spirit initiated...as we welcome new travelers to the shared journey on Palm Sunday...as we celebrate resurrection and honor new life within and without on Easter...as we appreciate the created order and vow to protect it on Earth Day...and as we commit ourselves again to the specific ministry of Get on the Bus at month's end.

In the Spirit who gives life to all, we continue to stand together as ministers of a new covenant. In the spirit of April Fools, I suggest we do so in the words of an old saying, "Angels can fly because they take themselves lightly...!" Breathe and let our covenant relationships bring life that is both abundant and joyful. Laugh with joy as we put into practice our banner words: Justice, love, mercy, kindness, compassion, walking humbly with God. Pray and Play with the new ideas God give us.

Welcome to this part of the journey, marked by our Spirit-given covenants of newness!

Whose parade do we follow? Using the work of Jesus Seminar scholars, Marcus Borg and Dominic Crossan, we explore the two parades that entered Jerusalem on that long-ago Sunday. One was led by King Jesus, and the other no doubt led by some powerful representative of King Caesar. Some 2,000 years later, similar parades beckon. Which shall we follow and why? Today, we shall also welcome new covenanting members in a parade of hugs and handshakes unique to Redlands UCC!

April 9 – Maundy Thursday Seder Meal and Tenebrae – Reservations appreciated!

Beginning at **6:00 pm** in Covenant Hall, we will enjoy the distinctive tastes of the Seder (Passover) meal. The evening continues with a brief Tenebrae (darkness) service in which we hear again Jesus’ words and conversations leading up to his death. A moment of hope will sustain us until we re-gather on Easter Sunday. **Please make reservations for this service in the church office.** All ages are welcome!

April 12 – EASTER SUNRISE SERVICE IN THE GARDEN – 6:00 AM

We’ll meet inside the sanctuary in darkness lit by candlelight, read and sing and cluster together as did those first disciples, then gradually meander out to the garden for a joy-filled resurrection experience! Breakfast will follow at 6:45. Come! Celebrate! Christ is risen...again...still!

April 12 – “What Rock?” – Resurrection Sunday! – 10:30 am

*John 20:1-18; Mark 16:1-8*

The ultimate question... Beyond the historical doubts about a physical body, removed from the wonderings of who saw what and what was said at the garden tomb that first Easter morning, the ultimate question we verbalize as believers is “What Rock?” For with resurrection joy, roadblocks shrink, pathways become more clear, and rocks in front of tombs are replaced by thin air. The Easter morning story—ultimately a story of love and mystery—is told through the voice of Mary who encourages believers to love...hard to imagine a more appropriate way to fill that empty tomb than with a life of love. Come for the music, come for the prayers, come to hear the stories of mysterious love once again. More importantly, come to experience the new life, the resurrected life, which God has arranged especially for you!

April 19 – “Concrete Love” – Earth Day

*Acts 4:32-35; Psalm 133; John 20:19-31*

Meeting first inside to sing and pray, then (weather permitting) moving outside to appreciate and give thanks, this day invites us to embrace earth and earth creatures with a love that is concrete, real, relevant. Another baptism will highlight our shared responsibility to nurture all life. A great way to spend time with people who love you on the week after Easter egg overload!

April 26 – “All in the Family” – Rev. Bill Maury-Holmes, preaching

*1 John 3:1-7; Luke 24:36b-48*

For several years, we’ve been leaders in the Get on the Bus program—a program of transporting children to see their incarcerated mothers on the Friday before Mother’s Day. Today is a day of dedication and commitment, as we make that final push—spiritually, organizationally, and financially—to make this year’s visits happen. Come with eyes and hearts open to learn and to respond.

## President's Message

I get a real kick out of seeing young people maturing and gaining knowledge and confidence. You can imagine then, what a thrill it was attending Chapman University Founders Day on March 21. Barbie, Jacob and I, along with Mary Belle Carter and Domenick Sforza represented Redlands UCC in Orange as part of a day that starred over 80 DOC (Disciples on Campus) students. They coordinated, led, sang, acted, staffed, toured, created video, played instruments, ushered, conversed and did much, much more to make it a very enjoyable day for hundreds of UCC and Disciples of Christ attendees. In a word, the students were amazing! (I was especially proud of Sarah's involvement as a member of the planning committee and part of the 2009-10 DOC Leadership Board.)

Redlands United Church of Christ is a Partner Congregation with Chapman, as are about 15 other UCC congregations in the Southern California-Nevada conference, and the conference office itself. It's a proud heritage of our denomination and our local congregation to be involved in education. The UCC and our predecessors have started and sustained dozens of colleges, universities and seminaries throughout our history. That includes not only the likes of Harvard and Yale, but also colleges and universities founded to offer educational access and opportunity for Blacks in the South: Dillard University, Fisk University, LeMoyne-Owen College, Huston-Tillotson College, Talladega College and Tougaloo College.

With this kind of educational legacy, it comes as no surprise that RUCC is very connected to the University of Redlands (despite its Baptist roots!) with many of our church members and friends on the university's faculty and staff. Several folks work at other area colleges and universities. Many others work in the Redlands Unified School District and other neighboring schools. A few are home schooling. Several RUCC members are receiving financial assistance from our scholarship fund.

Education and the expanding of the mind are very important to us as individuals and as an institution. We encourage education and learning to take place every day in myriad ways. Our national UCC's educational mission includes a statement that: "All the realities and needs of life are occasions for learning—e.g., dealing with personal and social crises of life; wrestling with issues of ethics; exploring the meaning of Christian vocation; assessing the impact of science, technology, economics, and politics upon individuals and nations; and recognizing and opposing injustice in every form."

Martin Luther King, Jr. summed it up nicely when he said, "The function of education is to teach one to think intensively and to think critically... Intelligence plus character - that is the goal of true education." I believe education—critical thinking—is an important part of being open to our still-speaking God. It is when we open our minds to new thoughts, new ways of seeing our world and new ways of living our faith with our brothers and sisters, that we expand our own limited views to see all the way to God's limitless horizon.

Dear Friends of RUCC-

I once again wanted to take an opportunity to thank you for your invaluable support in allowing Candy Dietsch and meo represent us in Sacramento last month.

What we all need to bear in mind as we await the Supreme Court's decision is that Proposition 8 is an improper revision, rather than an amendment of the California Constitution, because it eliminated a basic right, but just for one minority -- a minority which has been a target of discrimination again and again.

This case is not just about marriage or gay people. If a simple majority of the voters can take this core right away from gay people, it can take any right away from any other group as well.

If Prop. 8 is upheld, then Californians could, for example, vote to take religious freedoms away from anyone who doesn't believe what the majority believes, or free speech rights away from women, or the right to vote away from Chinese-Americans, or the right of interracial couples to marry. This case is important for every Californian: it's about whether the limits we've set on the power of the majority have meaning.

The California courts have a solemn responsibility to enforce the state constitution to protect the rights of all people, regardless of popular opinion. We hope the court will recognize that it is not just the rights of lesbian and gay people, but the rights of all Californians that it must protect by striking down Proposition 8.

Please join me and the countless others who have so much to lose. There are many actions that you can take, beginning with using your voice. Communication is of key importance in expressing what is at stake. If Prop 8 is upheld, it will once again be placed on the ballot of the next election and because it won by a 2 percent margin, it will become necessary to change the minds of at least 2 out of every 100 people who voted in favor of this proposition.

You can contact your legislators... write letters, make phone calls, visit their offices. Let them know that we, as their voters, demand human rights now!

You can also donate your time and your money. We are fortunate here at RUCC that a group devoted to Marriage Equality is already in place and doing great work. Please support them in any way possible. It is a difficult feat for a few to be doing the work for many. They need your help and your support!

Again, thank you for who you are and the wonderful things you do. Keep up the good work!
